- There are over 130 million books in print. That's a lot to choose from!





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
### A book that hooked me...


### The Way of the Runner—Adharanand Finn

Despite owning but not having read Finn's first book, Running with the Kenyans, I bizarrely choose to give this a go following on from reading another book on running by an author called Chris McDougall (Born to Run). Being someone involved in teaching A Level PE and BTEC Sport Science I thought I would have a wider knowledge of the topic of this book which centred around a Japanese running race called 'ekiden'. In essence, ekiden a long distance relay race and is Japan's largest annual sporting event (similar to that of perhaps the FA Cup in England). A team of six runners has to run part of the total distance of a race and pass a baton of sorts to the next runner of the team once they have run their 'leg'. A race can range from having to run part of a 30 mile course to that of a 450 mile-long course(!), and in some cases takes three days to complete!

As a nation that enjoys running, companies and universities sponsor running teams and pay the athletes to run for them, similar to being an employee. In order for Finn to fully embrace the ekiden event and the training that goes into it, he, himself moves to Japan along with his wife and young children to discover about the culture, preparation and how seriously the Japanese approach this race whilst providing a experience of a life time for his family to assimilate into the Japanese society.

#### Where the Crawdads Sing—Delia Owens

I read this book during the summer of the national lockdown. Being whisked away to the beautiful marsh lands of Barkley Cove, a town on the North Carolina Coast, was the perfect form of escapism. Owen's detailed layers of description allows you to vividly imagine the world that the protagonist, Kya, inhabits. This book challenged my expectations of storytelling as the setting dominates the narrative and often takes precedence over the dialogue of characters.

I will let the blurb entice you:

For years, rumours of the 'Marsh Girl' have haunted Barkley Cove. So in late 1969, when handsome Chase Andrews is found dead, the locals immediately suspect Kya Clark, the so-called Marsh Girl. But Kya is not what they say. Sensitive and intelligent, she has survived for years alone in the marsh that she calls home, finding friends in the gulls and lessons in the sand. Then the time comes when she yearns to be loved. When two young men from town become intrigued by her wild beauty, Kya opens herself to a new life—until the unthinkable happens.

Due to its success on The New York Times Fiction Best Sellers list, Where the Crawdads Sing is now being adapted for the big screen. Although this is positive publicity for the author, and may encourage others to pick up and read it, I am apprehensive about the director's ability to do the book justice and wonder if the images created in my mind will be distorted as a result.

I would recommend this book to anybody who is interested in murder mysteries, coming of age stories or beautiful places around the world! - **Miss Foster**
