DRAMA

The history department provided students with an impactful approach to Remembrance Day this November. History classes on the 11th November were tasked with designing their own poppies, either reflecting those currently used to

commemorate veterans or creating their own. Students were then taken down to the trenches in the Outdoor Learning Centre and, after observing their own quiet reflections with a tour around the trench itself. planted their designs in the surrounding ground. As the day



drew on, a memorial garden was created by the students to remember all those that fought in the First World War and the conflicts that followed.

The Drama SAS group have spent the term writing scripts and devising plays based around various different topics. For their end of term performance, they took the idea of the original nativity and applied the ideas to the modern world. finally creating a modern Nativity set in the local area. Our pupil director Macy Harper worked fantastically with different

groups of performers to create both original and modern versions of the Nativity, performed alongside each other. **Pupils created** costumes, designed lighting and hair styles and developed their performance skills fantastically. They should be very proud of themselves.







In October 2021, A level art students headed to Birmingham city centre with Mrs. Perez to visit the Ikon Gallery. We toured the exhibition: We Thought About It A Lot, and other shared drawings, which was a selection of collaborative works by British artists Bill Woodrow and Richard Deacon. The artworks in this exhibition were layered through a range of techniques including collage, frottage, and drawing in pencil or pen and ink. This was a great opportunity for year 13 students to explore their theme of juxtaposition and for year 12 students to visualise the impacts of Cubism on contemporary art. It was also a good opportunity to appreciate the value of collaboration and experimentation. Students responded to the exhibition through shared drawings and were introduced to the Ikon Youth Programme- which is a programme for young people aged 16-21 who meet regularly to make artwork, work with professional artists, host events and develop their own projects.






In both sports you wear the same uniform. Females wear leotards and males wear leotards with leggings or shorts.


Equipment

GEOGRAPHY

Geography Trip Storm Arwen didn't stop our Year 7 fieldwork



Year 7 were involved in traffic counts and environmental quality surveys w/c 22nd November as part of their year 7 fieldwork assignment. The fieldwork aims to see how environmental quality differs in different parts of the Bradshaw model (a model which shows the stages and layouts of town and city development).

In non-covid years we have taken the students out to look at our local area, this year we were unable to go further than the school gates. Storm Arwen added an extra layer of difficulty, but like true Geographers, our year 7s dodged the rain and coped with the cold to collect their results. Fieldwork is crucial to Geography. It allows us to see what is actually happening in a place, rather than just learn from the board. Students take part in fieldwork every year, except exam years, at TGAK, including a rivers study and a tourism study for GCSE and a week's residential for A level. In the words of Lila Grimes (a year 7 student) 'doing this makes me a proper geographer', and we couldn't agree more.

College Tull

Tull College is named after Walter Tull, a professional football player and soldier during World War One. Walter Tull is recognised as one of the first black professional footballers in England and the first black officer to lead white British soldiers into battle. His success was built on characteristics from our own Tudor Habits and he is a fantastic role model for students in our college!

Walter Tull came from a mixed-race family; his mother was from England and his father was from Barbados. Both of his parents had died by the time he was nine years old, and Walter was moved from the Kent countryside to live in a London orphanage. Whilst Walter was at the orphanage, he discovered a love of football and became one of the first black professional players in England. Tull played for Tottenham Hotspur at White Hart Lane, but because black players were rare, he suffered terrible racist abuse.

When WWI began, Tull enlisted in the army as part of the 'Footballers' Battalion' with other professional players from a range of clubs. He was involved in lots of battles and suffered from Shell Shock which meant he was sent back to England to recover. When he was in England, Tull began to train as an Officer, but at the time, only a white soldier could be trained as an officer. Tull's superiors thought so highly of him that they allowed him to be an exception and he became the first black man to lead white troops in battle on the front line for the British Army. Tull was killed in action, aged 29, during March 1918 as he led his soldiers across No Man's Land towards the German trenches.



Walter Tull is remembered as someone who was incredibly resilient throughout his life. He was always aspirational, respectful, inquisitive and let his hardworking attitude help him overcome huge barriers. He was responsible for challenging inequality and discrimination in football and the armed forces.

STEPHEN HAWKING

"Intelligence is the ability to adapt to change"


Hawking College was named after professor Stephen Hawking who was one of the most influential scientists of modern times. During his life he helped to solve some of the biggest mysteries of the universe and helped ordinary people to understand science. In doing so, he can be considered to be a fantastic role model for Hawking students as his success was built on characteristics that can be found in our very own Tudor Habits!



Born in 1942, Stephen was clever, curious and loved mathematics! He studied and worked at two of the world's most famous universities, Oxford and Cambridge. He said his aspiration was to have a complete understanding of the Universe.

But when he was 21, Stephen's body developed a disease called ALS (amyotrophic lateral sclerosis). His brain stopped sending messages to his body properly. He was told he only had two years to live. Nevertheless, he carried on with his work. After a few years, he couldn't walk or talk and needed a special wheelchair. But he had lived longer than anyone expected and died aged 76 in 2018 after achieving great success throughout his life.

Throughout his life he demonstrated great resilience, tremendous hardworking attitude, and a continued inquisitive nature. He had high aspirations from an early age, was always respectful and was responsible for solving great scientific mysteries such as the origin of black holes.

Who am I?

Isaac Newton was born in 1643 and considered one of the most important scientists in history. He became famous for his work on gravity, where he observed an apple falling to the ground from a tree causing him to theorise about gravity, and his three laws of motion. He was also well known for his work on light and colour, and what is now called calculus (a part of mathematics).

Newton is quoted as having said that "If I have seen further than others, it is by standing upon the shoulders of giants." demonstrating that he respected the work of those who came before him.

The year 7 football team took to the field for their first ever match for Tudor Grange Kingshurst against a very strong St Edmund Campion school, who fielded 4 academy players.

From the start it was clear that Tudor Grange came to play. They were on the front foot putting pressure on the opposition whenever they had the ball. Chances were being created by slick passes, strong powerful running and a few sticky tricks. Tudor Grange thought they had gone 1-0 up through Zion only for the linesman to raise his flag for offside which stumped both sets of managers. Zion finally got his goal after chasing a ball over the top, out muscling the defender and with the outside of his right foot, slotted the ball past the goal keeper.

Their target was 265 miles or 426,476 meters or 1,422 laps of the 3G.

Meaning students beat the target set by a massive 48.54 miles. A huge well done to all of those who participated.

Extra-Curricular up and running

Since September we have had over 20 different clubs on offer for students and have had a staggering 250+ students attend. Our key meal deals are as follows: We have soup, sandwich and a home bake for £2.50 or we have our main course option where you can purchase a main meal from the counter with one side, and dessert for the Free School Meal value. We also have a baguette offer of £2.50 which consists of a baguette, home bake or fruit pot and a bottle of water. We offer one bottle of water for 65p or two bottles for £1.00.

We are a site that offers great home cooked food; all of our food is cooked fresh daily, including our selection of fresh dough pizzas and Stromboli calzone. All of our pasta sauces are fresh and red tractor certified. We offer weekly, our quirky bird offer of one piece of seasoned chicken along with two sides for £1.90. Our sides are: wedges, onion rings, vegetable rice, coleslaw, seasonal salad or garlic bread. This can also be upgraded with the option of having a dessert and custard for £2.50. We also offer a roast dinner one a week, along with other favourites such as our Bombay curry day with poppadoms, sauces and Indian selection sides. All of our home bakes are made, baked and produced on site. We offer good quality and locally sourced ingredients where possible, and produce that is in season which is promoted on our monthly food heroes.
